

# CEO & PRESIDENT'S LETTER

**As we all happily leave 2020 behind,** we are excited to enter into 2021 with an opportunity to serve more children and families in need in Bexar County.

Boysville is more than just a home for children. Boysville continues to evolve to meet the ever-changing needs of the community. As a legacy leader in family-centered care, we continue to provide holistic, wrap-around services to girls and boys, infants to young adults, needing a safe place to call home. Our cradle to college programming is offered through five programs: Emergency Shelter, Residential Foster Care, Community Based Foster Care and our Supervised Independent Living Programs. All programs are guided by evidence-based practices such as trauma-informed care through Trust-Based Relational Interventions (TBRI) and therapeutic services. We continue to ensure that educational, spiritual and vocational support is available to all the children and youth we serve. This year, we served over 250 children, youth, and young adults through our programs.

Now as we look to 2021, we will expand our scope to serve a growing yet underserved population of teen moms and their infants/toddlers currently in foster care. Currently, there are only five organizations in Texas that provide services for pregnant teens. Texas is in desperate need of additional capacity to care for these young moms and children.

Our community outreach program, SPARK (Supporting Parents and Reaching Kids) provides parent and caregiver training to anyone needing guidance raising children and teens. While most parenting programs are geared towards children under three, Boysville understands that raising teens can be just as challenging as raising toddlers. Our program is free and available to anyone caring for children, 0-17 years old.

In 2020, our successes far outshined the challenges of COVID. We had seven amazing young adults graduate from high school. We rooted for Dominic as he left for Army boot camp and we walked with five families through the adoption process to become forever families for their foster children.

We are grateful to the Board of Directors, our corporate and foundation partners, and our individual donors and volunteers who continued to provide support and guidance through this pandemic year.

Our children remained resilient, hopeful, and loved—all because of your continued support in 2020.

Many families, no matter their socio-economic background, struggle with raising children in today's society. However, families who have experienced trauma, including abuse, neglect or economic distress, are more likely to have difficulties in maintaining a healthy home.

"Every child is not designed the same way," said Vicky Rine, Director of SPARK (Supporting Parents and Reaching Kids) and lead parent educator. "It is important to look at them individually." Rine noted that parents tend to do the same as their parents but that is not always the best model to follow.

While there are common generational behaviors in children (hormones, growth, trying to find their place in the world), their emotional development is not always equal.

By incorporating two evidence-based modalities, Trust Based Relational Interventions (TBRI) teachings along with Nurturing Parent Program, Rine teaches parents and caregivers how to interact with their children, understand their brain development, and how that development impacts their emotional growth.

"We need to meet children where they are at emotionally. The key is individual connections," said Rine. It is important to understand what is causing a child's negative behavior. "Being in tune and really listening helps parents connect with their children."

Rine understands how trauma that comes from early childhood experiences impacts a child's growth and development. Childhood trauma can include divorce, loss of a parent or loved one as well as abuse or neglect.

Vicky is a nationally recognized and award-winning parent educator with over 25 years of **experience.** Her background includes working with area school districts, Region 20, and the Precious Minds, New Connections program. Vicky brings a wealth of knowledge and understanding to today's parenting issues.

As the program director of SPARK she is a certified parent educator using the evidence and research-based, Nurturing Parenting Program. She is also a Trust Based Relational Interventions (TBRI) Practitioner She utilizes a combination of evidence-based programs to teach and individually coach parents and caregivers to become more effective and confident in their skills in parenting their own children.




## YEAR IN REVIEW

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Adam, 18, is a quiet, intelligent, young man who likes to spend his time caring and advocating for animals.

"I'm not a people person," said Adam. However, Adam is an animal person with a heart for wildlife and, more importantly, conservation. "We always had animals growing up," said Adam. The list included dogs, bunnies, lizards and more. "We basically had a zoo."

When Adam and his brother arrived at Boysville almost five years ago, it was very awkward for them. "My brother means the world to me," said Adam. "I am glad we are together and not separated."

The awkwardness didn't last long. Soon he realized that he had people around him who were "really kind and really cared" about him. He formed friendships with the other residents and staff. "I was really grateful to have staff around me and my brother who really cared about us," said Adam.

Both young men are thriving and doing very well in school.

"I really need to give credit to Mr. Tomas and Ms. Linda. They were really sweet and kind from the beginning." Tomas and Linda were Adam's house parents when he arrived. It was Mr. Tomas who encouraged Adam to follow his passion of caring for animals as well as pushed him to try new opportunities.

With the encouragement of Mr. Tomas, Adam became a volunteer at the San Antonio Zoo. Every Saturday, Mr. Tomas and Adam would make the 20 mile drive to and from the zoo.

After two years, Adam was offered a job working in the butterfly house.

"I don't like insects but the butterflies were nice," said Adam, laughing.

Now, the previously shy young man, Adam does exhibit interpreting for the giraffes, flamingos and lorikeets. He is the one who introduces guests to the exhibits and explains the different traits of the animals. "It's a good people skill," said Adam about doing the presentations. "It's important to have that."

Adam is planning on attending

Texas State University and majoring in Wildlife Biology. He wants to travel, work with animals, and explain to others why animal conservation in the wild is important.

"Animals have feelings, especially mammals, and it is important to leave them alone in the wild," said Adam.

Adam is now in the Supervised Independent Living Program (SIL) at Boysville. He appreciates the support that the SIL program gives him. "They are really inspiring people," said Adam. "They want me to be successful in everything I do."





## **EXPENSES**


Where the money went in the fiscal year ended June 30, 2020
